Neighborhood Clean Up Scheduled Saturday May 20th, 2006

JPNA (Johnson's Park Neighborhood Association) residents will conduct a neighborhood clean up on Saturday May 20th, 2006. The purpose is to promote cleanliness and demonstrate a sense of pride in our community.

Volunteers will meet at the Johnsons Park pavilion at 9:30 am and be issued trash bags, shovels, brooms, rakes and gloves. Teams will be formed and assigned to clean the public alleyways, sidewalks and vacant lots located between 17th thru 19th Streets and Walnut to Brown Streets.

dumpsters throughout the area. Residents are asked to place non-hazardous items into the dumpsters.

There will be food and refreshments for the volunteers at approximately 12:00 Noon when the teams return to Johnsons Park.

City Rules For Disposal Of Items

Disposal of Furniture and/or extra items

We've simplified bulky collection so you can now place items (not larger than the size of two couches) at your collection point on your scheduled collection day. Your regular collection crew is instructed to take your extra items.

Bulky waste that is placed at the wrong location (at the curb when there is alley collection) or waste that is not contained will result in referral to the Department of Neighborhood Services. This may result in cleanup orders issued and fines levied against the property.

For bulky waste that exceeds the size of two couches or if extra items are not removed on your collection day, call 286-8282. Bulky waste can also be taken to a City [self-help center](#).

Disposal of Brush

The City no longer collects brush piles exceeding 4 cubic yards. There is no brush collection in December, January or February. To request collection of smaller brush piles from March through November, you must call 286-8282. Brush is collected separate from garbage and composted. Composting not only saves the City money, it is environmentally responsible. Brush can also be taken to a City [self-help center](#).

Disposal of Tires

City of Milwaukee residents may dispose of up to five tires at a City [self-help center](#). Tires will not be picked up by your regular collection crew.

If you find a pile of discarded tires, please call the City of Milwaukee Health Department for pickup (414) 286-3538.

Disposal of Appliances

The City of Milwaukee no longer picks up appliances such as refrigerators, washers, dryers, hot water heaters. For disposal of these items, please use exchange programs from retail outlets or check the Yellow Pages for a list of appliance collectors. Appliances left in the public right of way may be cited and assessed a fee up to \$500. For more information on appliance disposal, you may also contact the DPW Call Center at 286-8282.

Disposal of Construction & Demolition Debris

City of Milwaukee residents may dispose of up to two cubic yards of construction debris at a City [self-help center](#). Two cubic yards equals 3' X 3' X 6' or the amount of material that fits in the bed of a typical pickup truck. Construction and demolition debris includes concrete, dirt, wood waste and roofing material.

Self Help Center Information

City of Milwaukee residents have two convenient locations where they can dispose of items like garbage, yard waste, used motor oil, up to five tires, brush, furniture and appliances as well as recyclable materials. When you arrive at a self-help center, you will be asked to provide proof of City of Milwaukee residency or property ownership. You will then be directed to unload your vehicle. Report Crime & Possibly Receive A Reward

WeTip is a national nonprofit organization, staffing tip operators that take anonymous tips from all 50 states including Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. For over 33 years, WeTip has taken over 411,000 tips. These Tips are always anonymous, WeTip never knows who you are. The hotlines are answered by bilingual tip operators, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

When someone calls WeTip, no one asks them who they are or where they live. The operator will answer, "this is the WeTip hotline, please do not give your name" after this the WeTip operator asks some questions to find out about the crime and who committed it. The operator will give the caller a case number so that they can call back if they find out more information, or if they want to find out the status of the case. No one will ever know who made the call...Not us... Not ever!

The tipster is then asked if they are interested in a reward if there is an arrest and a conviction. If they are interested in a reward, they are given a fictitious code name. This is the name to give when they pick up their reward. If the person who was turned in gets arrested and is found guilty, then a reward of up to \$1,000 is offered to the tipster. The reward is paid at the post office chosen by the person who gave the tip. They will receive the cash reward money by giving the code name that was given them when the tip was first given.

WeTip forwards the information to law enforcement, in the proper jurisdiction. The information is faxed to designated investigators in member cities. It is up to law enforcement to decide the best course of investigative action to take at that point. WeTip tracks the cases through police custody and prosecution and then when there has been a conviction in the case, WeTip approves a reward, and generates a press release, distributed to local media, and here on the internet, informing the caller (informant) there there is a reward approved on the case.
