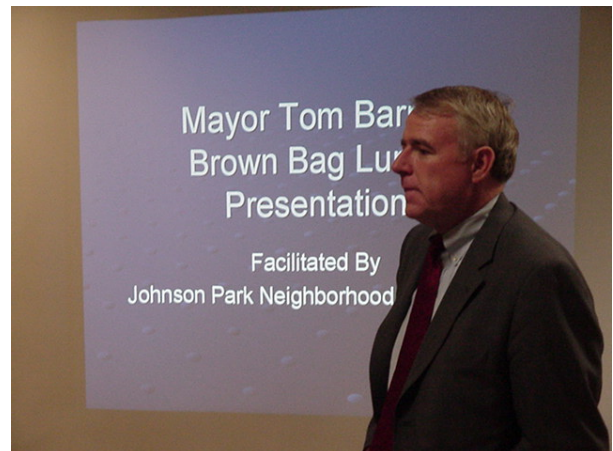

Strategic Objectives

Programs & Activities: We will offer economic, social, and educational programs and activities for all neighborhood residents.

Services: We will increase awareness of local and state services that will benefit the residents of our neighborhood. We will promote JPNA services to residents to strengthen neighborhood relationships.

Strategic Partnerships: We will build, maintain, and grow partnerships with community, county, city, and state organizations. We will also partner with various cultural entities as part of our community revitalization efforts.

Community Resources: We will encourage our residents to participate in area youth programs and educational opportunities provided by local churches, educational institutions, and civic agencies.

Block Watch Program

JPNA has established an organize block watch program. Resources have been developed for use in training residents on strategies for fighting crime. These include neighborhood maps, city ordinances, telephone numbers for the county sheriff, city police and city departments. Members regularly attend crime meetings where ideas are shared with other neighborhood crime fighting groups. A telephone phone tree was created so participants have contact numbers for residents who agree to look out for one another.

JPNA Reports Suspicious Or Illegal Activity To The Police Department

Residents are trained and encouraged to report any suspicious activities directly to the Milwaukee Police department. 3rd District Captain James Harpole, has met with our block watch members and have given us direct access to his officers. No issue is “too small”. All reports are logged. When patterns related to certain properties are identified, the residents can expect a visit from the city and/or police.
